
Evolutionary change in FAMILY DYNAMICS

IS DIVORCE AT FAULT? EXPOSURE AND OUTCOME




Changes in dynamics may be related to divorce. Divorce has a profound impact on how people perceive marriage and families on a social, cultural, and

psychological level.


The most frequent reasons for divorce are infidelity, excessive conflict, and fighting, followed by being married too young, having money issues, not making a commitment, abusing drugs or alcohol, and domestic abuse (Scott et al., 2013). .


Roughly 42 % of all households in the United States have blended or stepfamilies. (Parker, 2011, cited in Oliver et al, 2018).

Near, 9.1% of children live with divorced parents, 7.4% with widowed or split parents while 7.3% live with unmarried parents. (Shiono & Quinn, 1994)
